Now, as the consequences of climate change are making themselves felt, the Netherlands are looking for new ways of working with nature to protect their manmade land. For the first time, engineers, urban designers and landscape architects are working together to redesign cities and countryside to create more space for water. Traditionally the enemy, water is gradually becoming a 'frenemy'. And just as in the past, the world is looking to the Netherlands for forward-thinking, long-term solutions.
