MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CENTRE FOR LIVEABLE CITIES AND UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME TO ENHANCE SUSTAINABLE URBAN DEVELOPMENT

27 January 2025 – Singapore's Centre for Liveable Cities (CLC), and United Nations agency, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to work together on leveraging urban technologies and innovation, to address sustainable urban development challenges around the world.

The MoU was signed by Hugh Lim, Executive Director, CLC, and Marcos Neto, UN Assistant Secretary-General and Director of the Bureau for Policy and Programme Support.

Objectives of the MoU

- This MoU, a first between CLC and UNDP, builds on an ongoing collaboration between CLC and UNDP. The new partnership seeks to strengthen partnership by tapping on CLC's expertise and networks in the urban sector and UNDP's global presence, to enhance sustainable urban development. It aims to harness the potential of people-centred urban technologies and innovation to improve the lives and livelihoods of city dwellers.
- 4 Under this MoU, CLC and UNDP will build on the exchange of best ideas and practices to support efforts in building liveable cities that are dynamic, vibrant, cohesive and sustainable. This will include promoting sustainable urban development through knowledge sharing sessions, external symposiums, conferences and other national or global platforms. Key events include the World Cities Summit 2026, CLC's Lecture Series and Science of Cities Symposium.
- 5 CLC and UNDP look forward to deepening our partnership through the mutual exchange and creation of knowledge with this MoU. This will build on existing and ongoing research and frameworks that city leaders can implement such as CLC's refreshed Liveability Framework which was launched at the World Cities Summit 2024 in Singapore, as well as other topics of climate resilience, health and well-being.
- Hugh Lim, Executive Director of CLC said, "CLC is honoured to deepen our collaboration with a global partner like UNDP. As Singapore's knowledge centre for liveable and sustainable cities, CLC's work aligns closely with UNDP's mission as the operational arm of the United Nations, promoting sustainable development in cities worldwide."
